

Historical Background

- **County Formation:** Jefferson County was formed in 1804 from parts of Lycoming County and officially organized in 1830.
- **Naming:** Named for President Thomas Jefferson.

 - **Brookville**, the county seat, was established in 1830 and became a central hub for the county's legal and civic affairs.
 - The **timber industry** dominated the 19th century economy, followed by **coal mining** and **railroads**, which brought both prosperity and waves of immigration, particularly from Ireland, Italy, and Eastern Europe.

- Jefferson County played a modest but steady role in Civil War troop contributions and industrial growth in the Gilded Age.

Notes & Suggestions for Completion

- Wherever you see “—” under Year, you may need to check the township’s local library, historical society or church archives for the exact publication.
- For each item you locate, record: **Publication title, Year, Sponsor (borough/township/church), Page count or scope, and Where located (library/archives/catalogue).** That will help other researchers.

- The two large county histories (Scott & McKnight) serve as *frameworks* but you can supplement them with the smaller township/borough centennial volumes which provide more granular local detail.
- Use digital library searches (FamilySearch, HathiTrust, Internet Archive) with search terms like “[Township Name] PA centennial”, “[Church Name] anniversary booklet”, or “[Borough Name] history 19xx”.
- Contact the Jefferson County Historical Society (Brookville) to ask for a *bibliography of centennial publications by borough and township*, they may already have a list you can incorporate.

- **Search By Variant Names:** A borough like “Reynoldsville” may appear in older documents as “Reynold’s Ville” or under a township.

- **Read the Ads:** Business ads often name local owners and family-run stores.
- **Check School & Church Sections:** These usually list graduates, clergy, and choir members—great for identifying family units.
- **Use as Contextual Clues:** Even when your ancestors aren't named, these histories offer valuable insights into the communities they lived in.

Why This Matters for Genealogy

- **Name Changes / Disappearances:** An ancestor's residence or burial location may list a place that no longer appears on current maps.
- **Industry Boom-and-Bust:** Many of the vanishing places were tied to coal, coke, lumber or rail-industry towns — once prospering then faded.
- **Record Location:** Records from these places may still be filed under the township or borough as it exists now, so knowing the historic place helps.
- **Search Strategy:** When you see a place name that doesn't show on modern maps, check historic maps/reports (mining, lumber company records, ghost town lists) to locate its township and jurisdiction at the time.

Why These Matter for Genealogy

- Your ancestor's address or burial record might use one of these old place names, yet the modern map shows nothing.
- Land deeds and property transfers might refer to "Seat of the town of Blue Rock" or "lot in Lily Pond" — if you don't know the place was once used, you may miss the record.
- Church records or mining-roster listings may reference these locations even when modern maps don't.
- These places might fall under a current township or borough's jurisdiction, so knowing the old name is key to knowing where to look.

How To Find More

- Search older census volumes, especially 19th-century (1850–1900) for small place names — look for enumerations with "(P.O.)" or "P.O. name" columns.
- Review land deed indexes for place names that don't match current towns.
- Look into late-19th / early-20th century mining or lumber company rosters — many company towns no longer appear on modern maps.
- Use historic map collections (for example via the Pennsylvania State University "Early County Maps and Atlases" list). [Penn State Sites](#)

Birth & Death Records (1893–1905)

 - Bring **specific date ranges** or names to avoid full register searches.

Census Records

Federal Census (1790–1950)

Census Substitutes for Jefferson County

The 1890 Census Fire

Tax Records – Jefferson County, Pennsylvania

Tax records are often overlooked, but they're some of the earliest and most consistent records available for Jefferson County, Pennsylvania. They help place ancestors in a time and place, indicate property ownership, and can fill gaps left by missing censuses (like 1890).

Overview

Tax records in Pennsylvania were typically compiled annually at the county level, beginning before the formal organization of many counties. For Jefferson County, tax lists begin in the early 1800s, with earlier residents appearing in Lycoming County (its parent until 1804).

These records help establish:

- Residence and property ownership
 - Household economic status
 - Ages and names of heirs or children (in some years)
 - Absentee landowners

Historical Tax Laws & What Was Taxed

Colonial – Early Statehood (pre-1800)

Who Was Taxed?

- Male residents 21+ years old — even landless, if employed
- Landowners — both resident and absentee
- Estate representatives — taxes on behalf of the deceased
- Widows occasionally listed (especially if landholding)
- Some African Americans and immigrants — depending on the year

What Happened to Delinquent Taxes?

- Delinquents listed in annual printed reports or court dockets

- Property could be subject to tax sale or sheriff's sale

- Limited evidence, but may appear in Punxsutawney directories or merchant records

Coal, Coke, & Natural Gas Industries

Coal was king in Jefferson County from the mid-1800s to the 1930s, but it was **joined by steel and natural gas extraction** by the early 20th century.

Coal & Coke

- Found primarily in **Young, Winslow, and McCalmont** Townships
- Patch towns: **Eleanora, Walston, Wishaw, Kramer, Ramsaytown**
- Many residents were company-employed; **company store ledgers, pay stubs, and scrip** survive in private collections

Natural Gas

- **Jefferson County became a natural gas producer** as early as the 1880s

- Gas wells dotted areas like **Knox Township** and were often located near coal seams

 - **Deed books:** Look for mineral rights leases

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Steel & Foundries

 - The town was **abandoned after the mill burned down**
 - **Brookville and Reynoldsville** had iron foundries and machine works producing tools, stove parts, and components for railroads and mining
 - Smaller operations provided **seasonal or itinerant employment**—tracked via labor union minutes and business directories

Railroads

The expansion of railroads was critical to Jefferson County's development:

- **Low Grade Railroad** (constructed by the Allegheny Valley Railroad Co., late 1800s):
 - Ran from Red Bank to DuBois
 - Served coal towns: **Brockway, Punxsutawney, Reynoldsville**, and others
 - Transported both freight and passengers
- **Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh Railway (BR&P):**
 - Connected to New York markets
 - Carried coke and coal from **Walston and Eleanora** mines
- **Pennsylvania Railroad Lines:**
 - Short lines and spurs into rural areas (e.g., **Timblin, Sykesville**)
 - Many settlements existed **only because of these rail links**

Why it matters: Disease outbreaks (e.g., 1918 flu, typhoid) caused major local mortality spikes.

Where to find clues:

- **Death Registers** (1893–1906) – Jefferson County Orphans' Court
- **Hospital Admission Records** – Contact former local hospitals or county health board
- **Newspapers** – Excellent source for epidemics, quarantines, or mortality waves
